Summer time always brings guests from other parts of the country. It is a joy to have them pray with us. It is also obvious that the way the Mass is celebrated through the various diocese of our country can be different. This can result in some confusion or uncertainty. It can also cause some people to get upset. I think this may be rooted in false expectations.

When I was a small boy I remember being told that the Mass has never changed; it is always the same no matter where you go in the world. Historically and practically that was not the case. The Mass has gone through many changes down through the ages. The core – the part that is necessary – has been there from the beginning. However, the rituals and prayer practices that surround that core have evolved. For example, we have always used bread and wine, and the scriptural words Jesus spoke at the Last Supper have always been the same. However, the Eucharistic Prayers have developed and new ones have been added. The Sign of Peace was used in the beginning of the Church's history, was not used and was then restored again. This should not concern us. The richness of our tradition is grounded in unchanging truths. The way we reflect on those truths, celebrate them and apply them to our lives is a living and dynamic process. From an historical perspective, the Mass has remained the same AND has changed.

Practically, the Mass is a little different from place to place too. We are given the ritual structure through the guidance and direction of the Church in Rome. That ritual structure is laced through with the personalities and cultures of various peoples. Obviously the language is different from country to country. Different countries have different calendars of saints and the designation of the nature of the day's celebration can vary. Individual priests exercise their right as presiders to pick and choose from the options given in the ritual structure. There are alternate opening prayers, long and short forms of the readings and various introductory praises that a priest can choose or make up. Add to that the personality of the given priest and assembly, their temperament, understanding and

appreciation of the Mass and there are variations on the one "theme" of the Mass.

Bishops are also given certain rights and responsibilities regarding the celebration of the Mass in their diocese. For example, some dioceses do not allow girl altar services. Likewise some bishops do not allow Communion under both forms. As we all know, the bishop can also decide to change the structure of the Communion procession.

These variations should not cause us to be upset. However, they do. Why is that? Besides the false expectation we have about the Mass being exactly the same, I think embarrassment can cause this. We get upset when we are afraid of doing the wrong thing or standing out. We do not want to draw attention to ourselves. So fear of embarrassment can cause us to be upset.

I also think we get upset out of a sense of self-righteousness. When visiting another parish we judge the manner of the celebration as wrong if it is different from what we are familiar with. Without any understanding of the history of the parish and diocese, the spirituality of the assembly or the vision and dreams of the leadership, we dismiss them as being wrong. In truth a given congregation may not be following the universal norms. In those cases or in situations where the Mass is just different even if they don't break any rules, what should we do?

When visiting another parish, enter into the celebration with the conviction that the people and their leaders love the liturgy and want to sincerely pray to God. Enjoy the celebration and, if something is unfamiliar, do your best to participate in the ritual not with an attitude that what they are doing is wrong but with an openness that allows the Lord to touch you in that moment and in that ritual. If you are curious, ask the priest to help you understand why they did what they did if it was different from what you know. You will be going home to what is familiar and feels safe. Simply said, you are a guest of the Lord and the community present. Do what they do, respect it and trust that their history and experience is as valid as yours.
